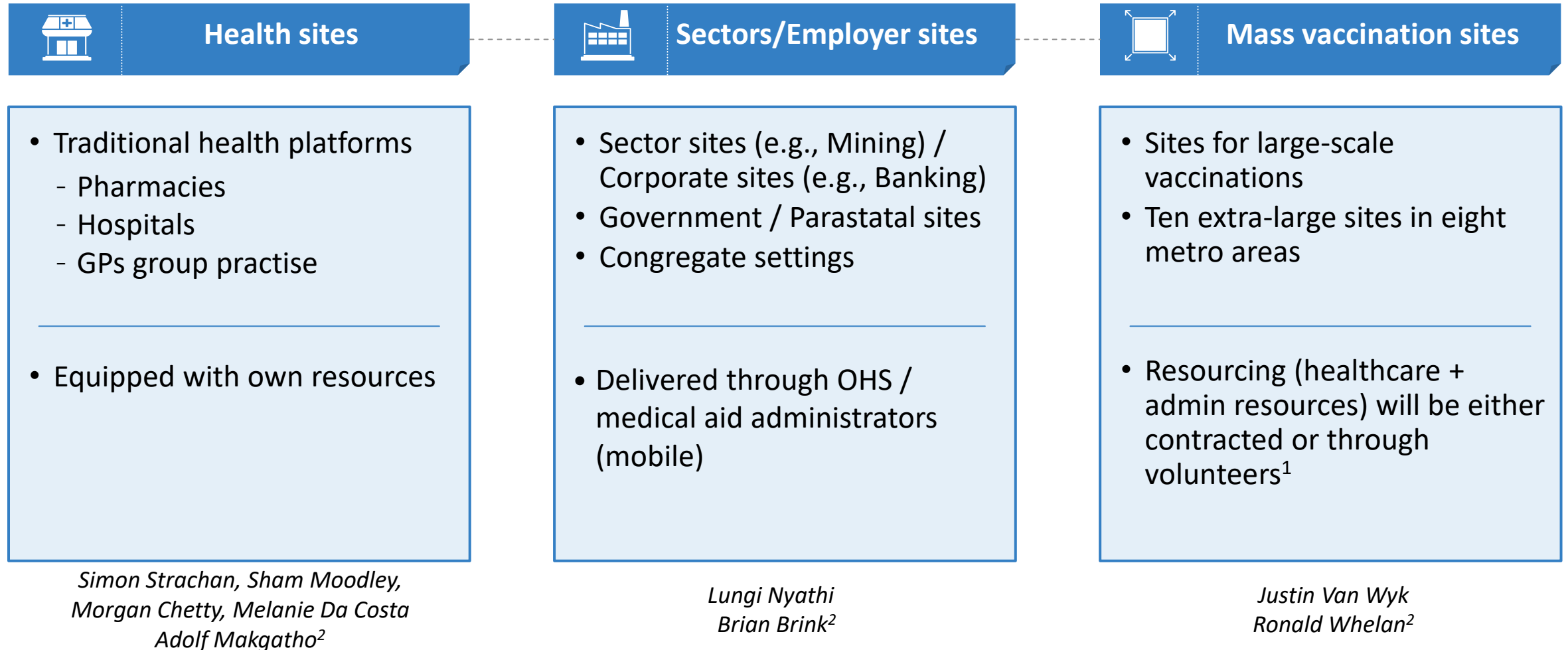

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Vaccines will be delivered through three distinct platforms – Sector / employer sites and mass vaccination support traditional health platforms



Note: 1. Pharmacies, GPs, specialists, nurses, allied healthcare workers and hospitals could support all service delivery sites, esp. mass vaccination sites. Could even support public sites that need additional capacity
2. Strategic Advisor

Steady capacity scale up in private sector over time to reach overall target of 250k vaccinations per day across public and private sectors

Phase I (from Feb '21)

Phase II (from May '21)

Phase III (from Nov '21)

Phase 1a: Sisonke

Phase 1b: HCW

17 trial sites being expanded to 50

Increase to ~385 sites

Vaccination capacity of ~48k vaccinations per day

Business Rules for Master Facility Shortlist

- Meet NDoH checklist (key items)
 - Pharmacy/ doctor/ permanent OHS
 - Section 22A permits
 - Cold chain and storage capacity
 - Ability to claim
 - Permanent or temporary fixed site
- 200 vaccinations per day (7 vaccinators/ Pfizer pack size 1,170)
- At least 5 000, aiming for 10 000 people
 - Employees only
 - Employees plus family/community
 - Satellite sites
- Special considerations for rural areas
 - Open to community ideally
 - JnJ vaccine

What to do next?

- Submit template for workplace sites (all sites)
 - Location (GPS coordinates)
 - Numbers of employees and family covered
 - Cold chain abilities (fridge 2-8 / freezer -20)
 - Number of vaccinators
- Register on Master Facility List
- Obtain Section 22A permit
- Ensure vaccinator training and registration
- Plan logistics and infrastructure
- If cannot meet master facility workplace site requirements:
 - Employees can be vaccinated at the community sites
 - Link to a Health site / permanent OHS site and run as an outreach (OHS site or mobile service)
 - Alternative solutions possible (e.g., retail sites)
