A note from Martin Kingston

Dear B4SA and business colleagues,

While we welcome the news that the country has moved to adjusted level two for the relief it will provide to many individuals and businesses, we would urge renewed caution in the face of the forthcoming fourth wave.

It is tempting, when regulations are relaxed, to let down our guards, but we need to be just as vigilant about all of the non-pharmaceutical interventions to prevent infection, and continue to pursue vaccination, ventilation, masking, social distancing and hand hygiene in every situation we find ourselves in.

Vaccination demand remains below the required levels and, although we might be tired of hearing it, we need to continue to urge everyone we know who has not yet availed themselves of a jab to go and do so with urgency. It is now easier than ever – all adults are eligible, vaccines are available for the insured and uninsured at all vaccination sites, public and private, and when you register, you can even choose when and where to get jabbed.

Vaccination is especially important for those aged 50 and older, as they are at the highest risk – although all adults should get their shots as soon as possible. Covid-19 is going to be with us for the foreseeable future; we need to get as many people as possible vaccinated as it is our best chance of containing the virus and returning to a less restricted way of life.

Department of Sports, Arts & Culture issues a powerful call to action



The Department of Sport, Arts & Culture (DSAC) held a stirring press event at a deserted FNB Stadium on 8 September, expressing DSAC's total commitment to the vaccination programme, and outlining its plans to drive demand.

Deputy President David Mabuza, DSAC minister Nathi Mthethwa, deputy minister of health Sibongiseni Dhlomo, Gauteng premier David Makhura, B4SA's Stavros Nicolaou and a host of sports administrators and icons, musicians, actors and super fans gathered to stand behind one central message: that our reward for getting vaccinated is that we will be able to return to our stadiums, concert venues and theatres. The rallying cry is, "Return to play – it's in your hands".

Brand colloquium leaves agencies with food for thought

On 3 September, B4SA convened a brand colloquium that saw a great deal of discussion and engagement around what South Africa's biggest brands could do to help drive and promote widespread vaccination in South Africa.

After a brief introduction by B4SA's Cas Coovadia and Timothy Schultz, the colloquium heard from David Harrison, NDOH (also CEO, DG Murray Trust and formerly CEO of loveLife) on the demand strategy government is putting in place. Brand guru Andy Rice and Mosala Philips, CMO, Old Mutual talked participants through the "why" for people and brands, and Fran Luckin, chief creative officer of Grey Africa presented campaigns from around the world to ignite inspiration for South African creatives.

Preetesh Sewraj, CEO of the Loerie Awards led a good discussion of some questions and concerns thereafter, and participants left the session with much to think about, and a good understanding that widespread vaccination is South Africa's ticket back to a more normal economy.
