VaxuMzansi is a campaign by the Religious Forum Against COVID-19 (RFAC) which is rooted on the premise of being a positive change-agent, as it aims to vaccinate at least 70% of their congregations and the communities in which they serve.

At the heart of the campaign are vaccine teams in religious branches who are tasked to continuously share COVID-19 and vaccine content with their congregations and communities, coordinate vaccine drives and assist in closing vaccine access gap among members of their congregation.

#VaxuMzansi will be officially launched on Heritage Day, 24 September under the theme we call National Vaccine Day. The campaign will be stationed in various provinces with the hub being in Phoenix Centre, as a healing and reconciliation response as we try to not only vaccinate the nation but stand in solidarity to address another pandemic which is the issue surrounding racial intolerance and religious hate. This event will be attended by Bishop Malusi Mpumlwana, Pundit Ashwin Trikamjee, MJC, Religions For Peace, Senior Swami Vedanand, Ekam, Shembe and KZNCC.
