This report is for communicators promoting the uptake of the Covid-19 vaccination programme. We hope it will help guide you as you shape communication to best suit your audience.



- Thank you for making the first Vooma Vaccination Weekend a success!
- This was the largest mass mobilisation in support of the Covid-19 vaccination programme.
- Over **350,000** people were vaccinated. While we did not achieve our ambition of 500,000 vaccinations, the number of people vaccinated was twice as high as the average number recorded over the prior three weekends.
- This shows that we can get many more people to come forward for vaccination through sustained communications and social mobilisation even as we look for other ways as well to encourage people to come forward.

Key Messages -

Address the concerns emerging on social media and from communities

The vaccine is safe

- There have been no deaths in South Africa as a result of Covid-19 vaccination.
- A few people have come for vaccination without realising they already have Covid-19, and have subsequently died – but they died from Covid infection and not from the vaccination.
- A few other people have died coincidentally following vaccination, as there are many other reasons why people die.
- When you vaccinate millions of people, it is inevitable that deaths will occur not from the vaccine but from the many other reasons why people normally die.

The vaccine is your choice

- The President has made it clear that no one will be forced by government to get vaccinated.
- Some private companies may make it mandatory for their staff to get vaccinated, and private facilities and sports stadiums may choose only to admit people who have been vaccinated. That is their right, but it is not the position of government.
- We want people to get vaccinated because they want to, and because they are able to.

Reinforce the previous key messages - Highlight the National Contact Centre

- If you are 18 and above, don't wait any longer! Go and get vaccinated at a site near you. You don't even have to wait for an SMS telling you when and where to go.






Progress with Vaccination Rollout

Nearly one third of all adults have not received at least one dose of the vaccination (either J&J or 1st dose of Pfizer). Over one-fifth are now fully vaccinated

Progress by 4 October 2021



Encouragingly, the collective efforts over the past week have reversed the downwards trajectory in vaccinations, with 942,374 vaccinations recorded from Monday to Sunday (27.09 - 03.01) compared to 620,043 in the previous week (20-26.09).

Social Listening



Two important themes emerged from the social listening which need an urgent response.

Vaccinating in the Middle of a Pandemic

Inevitably, there are a number of first-hand accounts of family members having died soon after vaccination. This is the challenge of vaccinating in the middle of a pandemic. It is not like vaccination against childhood diseases or the human papilloma virus which causes cervical cancer, where the incidence of infections is low or not immediately life-threatening. Here and now, we are vaccinating people who may have contracted Covid-19 already, and without knowing it, come forward for vaccination. This is why there have been some cases of Covid-19 related deaths soon after vaccination (13 cases until the end of August 2021). These deaths have been due to the disease of Covid-19, and not vaccinations. Another 34 cases were found to be coincidental, due to other causes of death.

Mandatory Vaccination

Internationally there has been an increase in protests opposing vaccine mandates with the restrictions on job opportunities, access to and entry to facilities and restrictions on movement viewed violations of human rights. Whilst making vaccines mandatory is not the position of the government, other private institutions have the right to do so and it is possible that we will see many more of them announcing mandatory measures. Forced vaccination" is the focus of much political opposition and anti-vaxxers, though no one is proposing this and the choice to vaccinate is still the choice of individuals.

Congratulations to our Top Performing Provinces

President Cyril Ramaphosa handed certificates to the three top performing Provinces, which were ranked according to the following criteria, namely:

Coverage (% of population 18+ who have received at least one dose)

- Risk reduction (% of population 50+ who have received at least one dose, and male: female ratio)
- Equity (Ratio of uninsured: insured)*

The top-ranked Provinces were:

- 1. Eastern Cape
- 2. Limpopo
- 3. Western Cape

In addition, over 2,000 health workers and health service managers will receive a certificate signed by the President, Mr Cyril Ramaphosa, in appreciation of their work on the vaccination programmes. These awards are based on nominations from provinces and Districts, and we hope to be able to show similar recognition for the next Vooma Weekend event.

* The cutoff date of 15 September 2021 was used





Vooma Vaccination Weekend 1-3 October 2021



The figures

- Our target for the weekend was 500,000 people vaccinated. We achieved 71% of target, with late submissions still trickling in.
- As of 4 Oct 2021, records for a total of 353,819 people were vaccinated from Friday to Sunday.
- That is 1½ times more (1.55x) than the average of the two weekends prior to the Heritage Day weekend (where vaccinations were very low).
- Two out of three were first doses (66%), compared to an average of 62% first doses in the prior 21 days.
- The number of sites open on the Saturday was about 1,400 (approx. 50% of all sites), and 550 on Sunday. The increase in demand for vaccinations in those sites that were open (as opposed to) is still to be determined.

Comment

- We knew that the target of 500,000 was ambitious, but decided to commit to that number because that is the minimum required to reach 70% of the adult population by the end of the year. We simply cannot be less ambitious, because that would mean that we accept deaths in the 4th wave that we know can be prevented.
- It is encouraging to note that, in the week leading up to the Vooma Vaccination Weekend, the downward trend in daily vaccinations was reversed, and we experienced an upward trend.
