Introducing the Resource Mobilisation Fund



The President's Energy Action Plan

- Energy Action Plan announced by the President in July 2022 as a solution to the energy crisis
- National Energy Crisis Committee (NECOM) set up by Government as its structure to co-ordinate its response to the energy crisis
- NECOM is led day-to-day by DG Baleni, who reports directly to the President
- NECOM has 9 workstreams focused on the energy crisis
- NECOM has already made progress in several workstreams, including lifting the licensing threshold for private power generation projects & issuance of the battery RFP
- Government does not have the skills and capacity to fully execute the NECOM energy action plan: business was approached to source, co-ordinate and deploy capacity into the government on an expedited basis

The Resource Mobilisation Fund (RMF)



RMF Objective RMF has been established as a mechanism for **business to** support the implementation of the **President's energy plan** by **donating technical resources** to NECOM



RMF Principles An autonomous legal entity, with **decisions taken by the RMF Board** in the best interests of the RMF

The **RMF will administer funds raised from donors** and will provide **donations in kind** to capacitate the Government's efforts in relation to NECOM


The RMF will be accountable to its donors, the business community and the public at large

In line with its constitution, the RMF Board will execute its objectives in a fair, equitable, transparent, competitive and cost-effective manner, ensure integrity is always maintained and that the activities of the RMF withstand scrutiny

The RMF will not undertake any policy advocacy

RMF establishment status





The RMF has been established by agreement between its members as a **voluntary** association



ENS has provided advice to the RMF on its establishment and proposed functioning, including tax and regulatory matters (procurement and public finance implications)



KPMG has provided advice to the RMF in respect of its **procurement policy, processes** and related procedures



Auditors and a company secretary have been appointed by the RMF

- The RMF has received approval from SARS as a public benefit organisation (PBO) for: The provision of funds, assets, services, or other resources by way of donation to department of state or administration in the national or provincial or local sphere of government of the Republic
- The RMF must comply with the detailed requirements of section 30 of the Income Tax Act to obtain and to maintain its PBO status: all activities must be carried on in a non-profit manner and with an altruistic or philanthropic intent
- The RMF currently has 4 directors who will act independently of government and business structures

RMF Board

The RMF Board is responsible for all decisions of the RMF, including:

- Fundraising
- Procurement
- Appointment of service providers
- RMF budget
- Appropriate communications strategy to ensure transparency and stakeholder feedback

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Procurement advisory panel

- RMF Procurement Advisory Panel formed with 4 experts with public & private procurement expertise
- Procurement Advisory Panel provides advice to the RMF Board as required
- Procurement policy drafted with input from KPMG, ENS and RMF Procurement Advisory Panel, signed off by RMF Board on 14 Feb 2023

- Mentoring and support to contracted resources
- Accounting & reporting functions for the RMF

RMF principal activities

- Co-ordinate the contribution of the business sector to the Energy Action Plan ("Plan")
- Independently source, procure and deploy resources as identified by NECOM for the Plan
- Provide monitoring & evaluation feedback and reports to funders and other stakeholders
- Establish policies to achieve the RMF's objectives in a fair and transparent manner, ensuring integrity is maintained at all times

TRANSPARENCY: GOVERNANCE & REPORTING



RMF & GOVERNMENT RIGHT OF REFUSAL

All procurement decisions taken by the RMF Board, based upon recommendations from NBI and the Procurement Advisory Panel

The Government can not select the supplier or service provider whose goods or services are funded by donations to the RMF

Government can not determine pricing, terms of payment of suppliers or negotiate contracts with suppliers

Service providers will be contracted and paid by the RMF from donations received, **no funds will be provided to Government**

Each resource donated to Government will be the subject of a **resource donation agreement** signed between the RMF and the Presidency

The RMF Board will take all decisions independently of Government and business structures

A reporting structure has been agreed with Government, incorporating regular updates on resources donated and NECOM energy plan progress overall


Quarterly feedback and reporting provided to all donors and the public at large

Both the Presidency and RMF have a right of refusal:

- The Presidency can elect not to receive the donated services/service provider as selected by the RMF
- The RMF can elect not to make a donation of services to the Presidency

Procurement process – summary of process & roles





Capacity required – written requests received	Capacity required – awaiting written requests
A consulting firm with PMO capability to support overall programme management	An economist with expertise in tariff design and regulation
A legal firm	regulation
A comms agency to work across Energy Plan workstreams	Power station management engineer

Procurement

- All resource requests are made by the Presidency in writing, under the terms of the MOU between the RMF and the Presidency
- NBI, on behalf of the RMF, will run the procurement process and provide recommendations to the RMF Board
- Donated capacity will be utilised by government to expedite the Energy Action Plan
- Resources to be donated over a 12-18 month period, some potentially up to 2 years
- Procurement process has commenced on the 5 requests received
- Resources will report day-to-day to the Presidency
- RMF will be responsible for payments to service providers





Fundraising Status

- Initial budget of R100m: substantially all committed subject to completion of DD & documentation execution
- Funds raised by the RMF from donors including South African corporates and international donors
- RMF Board to approve all documentation relating to donations, including donation agreement between each donor and the RMF
